


Jim Schmerse Tom Davis Elwood Inch John Bury



USS PONCHATOULA (AO 148)

QUOTED FROM COMMISSIONING PROGRAM PHILADELPHIA NAVAL SHIPYARD



U.S.S. PONCHATOULA (AO 148) is the sixth of a new class of fleet oilers. She is 655 feet in length with a beam of 86 feet. She is designed primarily for rapid transfer of petroleum products and other cargo to the forces afloat operating at high speed and at long distances from base. U.S.S. PONCHATOULA will carry in addition to her own fuel supply nearly eight million gallons of fuel oil, aviation fuel, and diesel oil for delivery to the fleet at sea.

U.S.S. PONCHATOULA is armed with a powerful battery of automaticloading, rapid-firing guns, controlled by the most modern directors and radars. Her equipment also includes the latest developments in navigational radar and instruments, modern portable and built-in fire fighting facilities, and numerous high-powered radio receivers and transmitters. U.S.S. PONCHATOULA is one of the first fleet oilers to have air-conditioned working and living spaces for the increased comfort and efficiency of the entire ship's company.

Oilers of the United States Navy are named after rivers. The Ponchatoula River flows through the southwestern part of the Tongipahoa Parish, Louisiana, and enters the Tickfaw several miles southeast of Springfield in Livingston Parish.

The name Ponchatoula signifies "singing Hair." The Choctaw Indians gave this fanciful name to the stream because of the abundance of Spanish moss on the trees in its vicinity. The Indians, thinking that the moss sang in the wind, named the "Ponchitoawa" which was subsequently corrupted by white settlers of "Ponchatoula."









Ponchatoula Joins Active Navy Fleet

The last of five new \$10,000,000 oil tankers joined the Navy's fleet here yesterday as the USS Ponchatoula (AO-148) was commissioned in shipboard exercises at Pier 2.

More than 500 military and civilian guests boarded the towering ship to witness the commissioning rites in which Capt. William R. Wilson. USN, accepted command of the new oiler in traditional Navy ceremonies.

The Ponchatoula, built in New York Shipbuilding Corpora-

tion's Camden yard, is the fifth oiler to be commissioned here within a year. The first of the five oilers, USS Mississinewa, was placed in commission last Jan. 18. Other tankers since commissioned included the USS Hassayampa, USS Kawishiwi and USS Truckee.

Guest speaker at yesterday's ceremonies was the Honorable James H. Morrison, Louisiana congressman and nephew of Admiral Richmond P. Hobson, who, with a volunteer crew, bottled up a Spanish fleet in the Battle of Santiago Harbor during the Spanish-American war.

TH HIS SPRING PLOUGHIN'

The Ponchatoula was launched July 9, 1955, and sponsored by Mrs. Ingolf N. Kiland, wife of Rear Adm. Kiland, commandant of the Fifth Naval District. The fleet's newest addition

The fleet's newest addition has a displacement of more than 40,000 tons when loaded. She will carry a complement of 300 officers and enlisted men.

The 655-feet-long ship is named for the Ponchatoula River which rises near Hammond, La., and flows to the Natalbany River. Of Indian origin, the name means "falling hair" or "long hair."



Capt. William R. Wilson, USN, yesterday assumed com-mand of the USS Ponchatoula, new \$10,000,000 Navy oiler, in shipboard commissioning ceremonies here. A Navy Academy graduate ('32), Capt. Wilson has served aboard the USS Nevada, USS Lamberton, USS Pope and formerly com-manded the oiler Pawcatuck and minelayer T. E. Fraser. He was captured by the Japanese following the sinking of the destroyer Pope in March, 1942, and spent 42 months in Japanese prison camps. Prior to being chosen to command the Ponchatoula, he was with the Far East Command as deputy and acting Assistant Chief of Staff (Intelligence).
